The whole of the inside and outside of the hospital has been redecorated with, I think, the minimum of interference with the working of the hospital. I should like to thank the staff for putting up with any inconvenience caused with such good grace.

May I also thank the Hospital Management Committee for their support and consideration at all times.

In addition a vacancy for the period ending March, 1955, was filled by the appointment of Mrs. A. L. M. Barraclough, of West Byffeet, who had been a member of the former Committee of Management and has been actively associated with the hospital for many years as Red Cross Welfare Officer, in which capacity was included the organising of the Canteen Trolley service. A second vacancy, for the period ending March, 1956, was filled by the appointment of Mrs. M. Mitchiner, of Reigate. Mrs. Mitchiner is also a member of the Board of Governors of St. Thomas's Hospital, and a member of the Redhill Group H.M.C.

FOURTH ANNUAL REPORT

1st APRIL, 1953 - 31st MARCH, 1954

The usual full medical statistics and detail follow later in the ort and together with what is said below afford evidence of a r of increased activity.

The average daily number of in-patients was 151, a slight increase on the previous year, but in addition the average length of stay was a definite decrease indicating a greater number of admissions and discharges. This was accomplished in spite of the difficulty of arranging the discharge of elderly fracture cases which was mentioned in last year's report.

Out-Patients

The numbers continue to grow and an additional clinic has been arranged. The accommodation problem mentioned before and apecially in last year's report remains. A modest scheme of adaptation offering some alleviation pending a pernanent scheme was submitted to the Regional Board but was deferred because of the lack of money available for capital works. This alleviating scheme provided, inter alia, the almoner's department being removed to an adjacent storecome with suitable alterations and the merging of the former office space into the medical office. This part of the work was arranged to be carried out by our own staff and was in fact done outside the period of this report.

Visiting to Children's Wards

When the Management Committee considered the view and recommendations of the Ministry of Health as circulated to all hospitals throughout the country it was decided that the informal and flexible rules on visiting here would be extended to allow daily visiting for children. The change has worked quite satisfactorily and without inconvenience; in fact, as was anticipated, the wide area from which our patients are received and our semi-rural situation has meant that visitors are never numerous except on our original week-end visiting days.

The appointment of almoner became vacant early in the year and difficulty was experienced in attempts to fill the post. In consequence, the duties were re-organised and a substantial part was taken on by the Medical Office with some increased clerical assistance. An appointment of a part-time almoner then became feasible and was in fact arranged. The new arrangement works very smoothly.

Joint Consultative Committee for Staff

The chief activity of this Committee has been that of the Staff side in connection with patients' entertainments. Apart from the regular and popular internal broadcasting programmes, the Committee most successfully organised the celebrations on Corona-

Physiotherapy

The department has remained very busy with both in-patients and out-patients. Mention should be made that a running course is arranged so that two student physiotherapists at a time under training at St. Thomas's Hospital are received here for practical training. There is mutual benefit in the arrangement.

Application to the Regional Board for a new apparatus was made and approved after an inspection of the out-of-date existing apparatus. The new apparatus, 200 ma., unit with 26 R.A. tube and tubestand and latest type table, was installed during November and is very satisfactory. During the installation period full radiography service was maintained with adaptability and co-operation of all concerned.

Occupational Therapy

There was an increase in the number of patients attending the department in the year. The re-union party brought more ex-

patients than ever before and seems increasingly popular. A new departure this year was an exhibition of weaving done by the patients at the Pyrford Annual Flower Show, which promoted local interest.

Special School

Special School

The chief work of the school has been, as always, the attempt to continue in hospital the education which each boy and girl would have been receiving at his or her particular type of school. Other activities included the daily opening of the school branch of the Surrey County Library (some 300 books were read in the year), the weekly following of several series of school broadcasts, a weekly film show through the winter, a termly Sunday afternoon when parents are shown the children's work, a Saturday sports afternoon, and talks by a Gold Coast nurse in her native dress, and by a policeman. Two pupils each passed the General Certificate of Education in two subjects and two passed elementary R.S.A. in one subject each.

During the year the Rev. R. M. Wilson resigned and the diffi-culty of getting a part-time Chaplain was once again a problem. Fortunately, the Rev. R. G. Wells, Vicar of Ripley, agreed to do the duties, at least for the time being, with the result that all Chapel activities have continued satisfactorily in the period, although Mr. Wells has informed us that he would be unable to continue the duties retransently. duties permanently

Much useful help was again received from the local branches of the British Red Cross and St. John Ambulance Brigade.

Finance, Costs, Etc. (The figures in italics refer to the previous year and are for comparison).

The total nett cost of running the hospital including surgeons', salaries paid by the Regional Board directly, was £112,757 (£108,423).

This was equivalent to £13 16s. 9d. per patient per week (£13 14s. 0d.) after adjustment to allow for the cost of out-patients.

The average cost of each in-patient treated was £73 5s. 0d. (£33 17s. 9d.)

The average weekly cost for food was £1 5s. 3d. (£1 4s. 4d.)

It will be noted that expenditure under most headings has increased excepting Domestic Renewals and Maintenance of Build-ings, normal and extraordinary headings, which may be considered together, and these latter reflect the decreased tempo of the pro-gramme of complete internal and external redecoration which was commenced in 1950.

Redecorations, Adaptations, Etc.

The general programme of redecorations was virtually completed during the year. Among some minor works of adaptation and improvement was the provision of a sisters' sitting room which was achieved by the restoring of a large room which had been partitioned off for staff cubicles. The furnishing of this room was a gift. It was also found desirable and practicable to cubicle two spaces of the Staff Sick Floor to provide one for isolation purposes and the other for a surgery for Dr. Hardy, our visiting medical officer. His former surgery now reverts to its correct use as a staff bedroom. The re-arrangement is very, successful.

Basins with hot and cold water supplies were installed in 11 sisters' bedrooms at St. Nicholas.

Equipment, Etc.

Although economy, was chiefly the order of the day, it was found possible to replace the old motor mower, the fire fighting equipment was modernised by the installation of hose reels readily usable by all, the dish-washing machine at St. Nicholas was replaced and the metal runner wheels on ward cubicle curtains were replaced by fibre ones which, being noiseless, add greatly to the comfort of the patients.

A substantial purchase of linoleum was made towards the aim of floor covering for all staff bedrooms.

Numerous gifts and donations were gratefully received from individuals and from communities. Special mention may be made of a gift from the former Byfleet Nursing Association which, on being wound up, decided to give us the remaining balance of their funds for any specific and agreed purpose. At the time some difficulty had been experienced with our own cinema apparatus used to provide programmes on the wards and we were using a borrowed machine, so it was agreed that the gift would be used to purchase a completely new and up-to-date apparatus with all ancillary equipment and there was also sufficient to buy the hired machine for a stand-by. To inaugurate the new apparatus representatives of the Nursing Association and members of the Hospital Management Committee attended an exhibition of the film "Bambi" on the Children's Ward, followed by a party. The regular weekly shows on the wards are all the more appreciated because of the high quality performance of the new apparatus.

Other Amenities

Renewed thanks are due to the devoted and regular band of voluntary workers for the continuance of a visiting service to the wards of a hospital library service and of a travelling "shop" with postage stamps and stationery, toilet requisites, cigarettes, etc. A small profit which is earned by the latter is held at the disposal of the hospital for amenity purposes.

We are equally grateful too, to those helpers who run the buffet at St. Nicholas, providing light refreshments on out-patients and visiting days.
