ALL day long the scorching sun has poured down its burning rays, bronzing the toiling harvesters in the fields. But now, with the departure of Old Sol, soft shadows creep beneath the trees, and a little air ruffles the lake, so mirror-like at noontide.

In the quiet hush that has fallen over the water you step through the tall grass and pause for a moment to note that the glare is now off the lake. A vole, scared by your appearance, drops with a loud "plunk" from a mossy stone.
