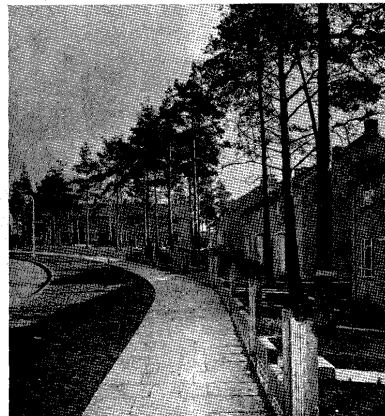

## SHEERWATER SCHOOLS' PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION

AN interesting meeting was held at the Secondary School on October 15th, 1958, when Dr. McLean, Miss Griffiths, Dr. MacPherson and Mr. Locke answered questions on Child Psychology, Child Guidance and other matters of interest to parents. The questions were varied and the answers were amusing as well as being clear and explanatory. Mr. Batchelor acted as Question Master and Chairman.

On the subject of Facial Twitches in children, the panel felt that the parents should endeavour to seek the cause without unduly emphasising the complaint. It was essential for the parents to treat this matter calmly.

The panel agreed that Corporal Punishment was not really a sound deterrent for "Teddy-boy" crimes. It was suggested that more corrective training centres were needed, although the Chairman, in his summing up, warned of the dangers of too much "sentimental thought."

The Common Entrance "hardy annual" cropped up again. This time it was how should parents with sons approach the examination? It was suggested that undue "urging" might be dangerous, and that the child's maturity and attainment should be considered in consultation with the head teacher, before the parents formulated their approach to the matter. Mr. Batchelor said that failure should not be emphasised as there were so many opportunities in all secondary schools nowadays, and Mr. Locke, in an amusing, reminiscent speech, advised "Try Sheerwater."

Someone wanted to know if parents should influence their children's choice of friends. The panel

agreed that too much influence often had the reverse, undesired effect, in that the unapproved of friendship continued even more strongly. Parents should set a standard for the children to observe and follow when it came to choosing their own friends and acquaintances. Children would be quick to follow a good example.

Mr. Batchelor, rather with his tongue in his cheek, suggested that in our youth we were all inclined to experiment and that, no doubt, all of us could recall one-time friends whom we might think twice about in our mature years.

Dr. McLean, in an answer on the effects of violence and horror on TV, said that she thought children's fantasy lives were full of horror, too, and the panel agreed that since such programmes were mainly for adults parents should be selective over their children's viewing. It was felt that often the suspense involved in a serial programme was often more damaging to a child, and that puppets, if not understood, could be very frightening to some children.

An amusing problem turned up. Mother explained that Father had trained his son to tell the truth at all costs, and that if a confession was forthcoming punishment could be avoided. After some fun, the panel advised that the punishment should fit the crime, whilst the Chairman suggested, "Punish Dad!"

The speakers agreed that belligerency in children was quite normal and a natural part of growing up, but that belligerency should not be confused with insolence and rudeness, which should not be tolerated.

Belligerency suggested an awareness of the competition found in life, and a complete lack of determination would be bad.

After some helpful advice from the speakers on how to encourage children to eat their meals, a question was put concerning the attainment and intelligence of children advised to attend the Child Guidance Clinic. The meeting was informed that, contrary to most of the children being below average as the questioner thought, usually a cross-section of society was examined and helped. Generally speaking, more children attending were above the average, since the parents of below average children were not so co-operative usually.

The Chairman thanked the Panel and summed up by quoting his favourite doctor, Doctor Johnson, who said, "I never consult physicians; I hope to die without them." Amidst general laughter, Mr. Batchelor advised the use of "horse-sense" and a real effort to overcome personal problems without outside help.

## SHEERWATER CENTRE AMATEUR FOOTBALL AND ATHLETIC CLUB

ALTHOUGH it is less than one month since the above club was inaugurated on October 8th, considerable progress has been made to establish a sound organisation. On reflection, it is difficult indeed to assess the importance or merit of the decisions so far taken by the Provisional Management Committee, so if my readers will bear with me a little I shall content myself with recapitulating in detail the measures decided to date.

I should like at once to say how gratified we, the Management Committee, are with the interest already shown in our activities and venture to suggest that in the not very distant future our club will be much in the news, but enough of generalisations; you will, I know, be interested in facts.

At the General Meeting to inaugurate the club, which was held in the Birch and Pines, a larger audience than is usually experienced was welcomed by Mr. J. A. T. McDermott, who took the chair provisionally, until the election of permanent officers to conduct the management of the club.

Mr. McDermott expressed his delight at the wide interest apparent at the meeting, stressing particularly the hope that something would be done to sustain the enthusiasm of the large number of youngsters, between the ages of eleven and fourteen, who had applied for membership, but regretfully had to be refused because the minimum age of 15 years had already been accepted. I hope, however, to give details in the December issue, of the plans being formulated to help these very eager beavers.

Draft rules governing membership and control of the club were introduced, and after lively debate were passed back to the committee for minor amendments and will be again presented at the next General Meeting on November 11th.

The following officers were then elected: Chairman, Mr. J. A. T. McDermott, who stated that he accepted provisionally until the next General Meeting, when it is hoped that a suitable person will come forward. Such a person has indeed come forward, namely, Mr. S. C. B. West, who, I'm sure, needs no introduction to most of you. Secretary, Mr. K. H. May; Treasurer, Mr. W. Hilleard; Equipment Officer, Mr. S. Morris; Team Manager, Mr. B. Taylor; Assistant Team Manager, Mr. J. French; Press Secretary, Mr. D. Thomas, and Committeeman Mr. J. Mildenhall complete the Management Committee.

A subscription list has officially been opened and many prominent people have already indicated their desire and willingness to contribute. Letters and contribution forms will, it is hoped, have been despatched individually to such people by the time this issue is in circulation.

On the strength of this known support, and assisted by the club's own fund-raising plans, the purchase of 24 shirts, shorts and stockings, plus 2 goalkeepers' jerseys and two top quality match footballs, has been authorised. These will have already been used in the public trials at West Byfleet Recreation Ground by the time these notes are being eagerly (we hope) read. The provision of track suits and other

playing equipment is under active consideration when funds permit.

The committee are striving to obtain a permanent home ground behind the Community Centre, and negotiations with the Urban District Council of Woking for the provision of flood-lighting of the ground are proceeding.

As you will see elsewhere in this issue a competition to design a club badge has been instituted through the good offices of the Community Association Council who have kindly offered to provide the prize money, so have a shot at designing a badge, Mum, Dad and the children; who knows, yours may win, but even if it doesn't you will be surprised at the fun you will get out of trying.

Dr. K. R. Pratt and Dr. G. Bruce have consented to act as club physicians, and we acknowledge with gratitude a very generous gesture by two such respected and important members of our community, especially considering the very heavy demands already made upon their time by us all.

As soon as is practicable we hope to include a ladies' section in the club in which all girls from 15 to 20 years will be encouraged to participate in such feminine pastimes as netball, hockey and other lady-like activities, and I will welcome the views of any ladies who care to contact me. You know, ladies, we men like having you around. Proof? We marry you and are content to spend our lives with you, so why should you become a "football widow"? Come and join in the fun and thrills as full and equal members of a really friendly club.

I have noted with relish a report in the "Woking News and Mail" of the appointment of Mr. H. A. Taylor, of 28, Bunyard Drive, as "tea manager," but lest he be inundated with requests from all and

sundry for a "good cup of char" let it be understood that the appointment is not intended as a benefit to the community as a whole, but is reserved for members of the Management Committee during their lengthy and energetic discussions at meetings. Congratulations, Bert! Stick the kettle on, I'm drooling already.

Finally, to be serious once more, I am especially pleased to be able to tell you of the outstanding achievement of the committee in persuading Mr. E. J. Drake, the famous Arsenal and England centre-forward, now the successful manager of Chelsea Football Club, to accept the presidency of Sheerwater Centre Football and Athletic Club.

We extend our warmest thanks to Ted and will strive our best to see that the club lives up to the very high standard of ability and sportsmanship he has always exhibited throughout his career.

I am certain that he will prove an undying inspiration to us all, both officials and players, and that we shall go from strength to strength in the future.

Our next public meeting will take place at the Community Centre on Tuesday, November 11th, at eight o'clock. Come along and bring your friends.

MISS B. CHASEMORE a teacher on the staff of Broadmere Infants' School, has gone to the United States to teach for a year. She is keeping her pupils informed of her experiences, and the walls of the school show on maps the route of her travels.

In her place, as already popular, has come Miss J. Sweeny, from Newark, New Jersey, U.S.A., where she is on the staff of the Ridge Wood School. She has been teaching for eight years in her own country, after having qualified at the State Teachers' College. Miss Sweeny, who is staying in Pirbright, speaks well of the hospitality of Woking folk. She has helped already in the Harvest Festival and the despatch of produce to the Sheerwater Old People's Club.

There are at least four more American teachers working in Surrey schools and, in the words of Mrs. Hollingdale, headmistress of the Infants' School, these exchanges are well worth while as a stimulus both to the teachers involved and to the children who are taught the same subjects with variations.
