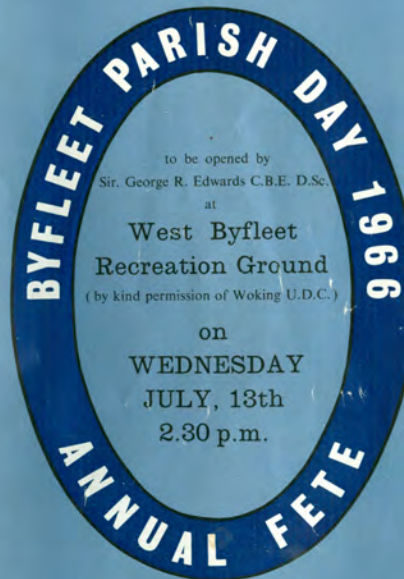

OUR NEW PRESIDENT

**SIR GEORGE ROBERT EDWARDS, C.B.E., D.Sc.,
Hon.F.R.Ae.S., Hon.F.A.I.A.A.**

Sir George Edwards first came to this area of Surrey in 1935 as a young draughtsman of 27. He came to Vickers Armstrongs Ltd., on the eve of the pre-war expansion in the aircraft industry and worked on design under men like Wallis and Pierson. He prepared for the tasks ahead by taking his B.Sc. at London University. By 1940 he had acquired a wide theoretical and practical knowledge of most aspects of aeronautical engineering.

In May 1940 he was Experimental Manager at Weybridge Works and, in this key role, was seconded to the then Ministry of Aircraft Production, working in factories other than his own. He was awarded the MBE in 1944.

In 1945 Sir George became Chief Designer of Vickers-Armstrongs Aircraft and worked on the Viking, which he saw as the opportunity to get into the civil aircraft market and to establish Weybridge as a major centre of post-war aircraft design. Then followed the Viscount, a revolutionary concept for whose acceptance he fought tooth and nail—followed by the first of the 'V' Bombers—the Valiant.

During this period (1945-1953) Sir George was honoured by his colleagues and by his firm. He was elected successively a Fellow, a Council Member, and a Vice-President of the Royal Aeronautical Society and was awarded the George Taylor Gold Medal for Aeronautics. At Weybridge, he became a special director, a Director, Chief Engineer and General Manager, and in March 1953, Managing Director. He was also promoted to C.B.E.

Sir George was now combining his engineering and design ability with a flair for organisation and international salesmanship. In the period 1953/60, with his Viscount still selling all over the world, he was elected to the Board of Vickers Limited, became President and an Hon. Fellow of the Royal Aeronautical Society, an Hon. Fellow of the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics and one of the few Englishmen to be awarded the Daniel Guggenheim Medal. He was knighted in 1957, and elected a Vice-President of the Royal Society of Arts.

In 1960, on the formation of British Aircraft Corporation, which included the then Vickers Armstrongs (Aircraft) Limited, Sir George became Executive Director (Aircraft) of the new Corporation and, shortly afterwards, became Managing Director. This post, together with that of Executive Chairman of B.A.C. (Operating) Limited, he still holds. He is an Hon. Fellow of the Manchester College of Science and Technology and in 1962 became an Hon. D.Sc. of Southampton University; in 1964 he was named Pro-Chancellor Elect of the University of Surrey at Guildford.

Sir George and Lady Edwards have always held a lively interest in local affairs. They lived in West Byfleet for many years, and on moving to Bookham, retained close touch with the social and religious life of the area. In particular, Sir George has taken an interest in and supported Byfleet Parish Day and has attended most of the annual functions for many years.

His hobbies are various and include cricket, golf, sailing and painting.

- 2 large eggs.
Their weight, in shells, in margarine and castor sugar and McDougall's Super-Sifted Self-Raising Flour.
