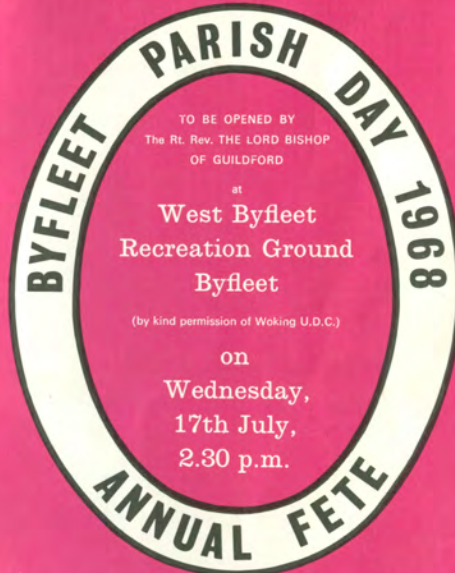

### THE OPENER

#### GEORGE REINDORP, BISHOP OF GUILDFORD

Born in 1911, he was educated at Felsted, Trinity College, Cambridge (M.A.) and Westcott House. After serving his curacy at St. Mary Abbot, Kensington, he became chaplain in the R.N.V.R., after the war Vicar of St. Stephen's, Rochester Row, Westminster, a large parish in central London. It was at this time that he first became well known for his radio and television broadcasts. In 1957 he was appointed Provost of Southwark Cathedral. He was consecrated Bishop of Guildford in March, 1961. Lambeth D.D., 1961.

Chief among his many interests are religious broadcasting and his work for marriage guidance. He has been a member of the Church Information Board and the Archbishop's Council for Radio and Television, and was Theological Adviser to the Church Times. He has just completed five years as Chairman of the Recruitment Committee of the Advisory Council for the Church's Ministry. He is Chaplain to the College of General Practitioners.

His wife, Alix, is a doctor and devoted much of her time to working for children's clinics, as well as looking after the home. They have four children, three sons and a daughter (22, 18, 14, 12). Now as a Bishop's wife she continues lecturing in schools, hospitals, and parents' groups, and to other groups on personal relationships. She was senior student at the University of Capetown and obtained a Swimming Blue.

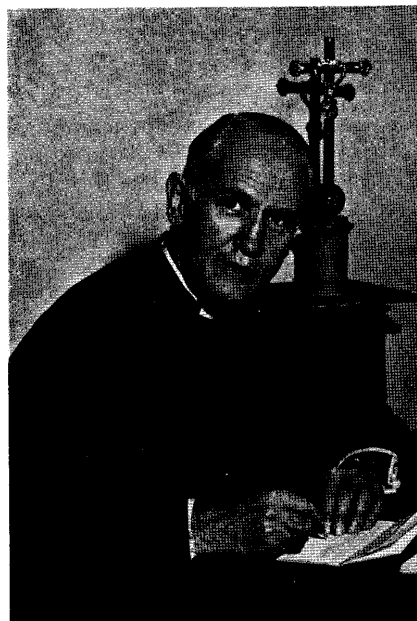

RECIPE FOR COFFEE WALNUT CAKE

- ½ lb. Self-raising Flour.
- ½ teaspoon salt.
- 6 oz. butter or margarine.
- 6 oz. castor sugar.
- 3 eggs.
- 1 tablespoonful coffee essence.
- 1 tablespoonful milk.
- 2 oz. chopped walnuts.

Cream together butter and sugar, and beat until mixture is light in colour and fluffy in texture. Sieve together the flour and salt, add eggs one at a time with a little of the flour. Stir, then beat thoroughly. Stir in milk and coffee essence and a little flour. Beat again. Add walnuts and the rest of the sieved flour. Stir in thoroughly but do not beat. Put mixture in a lined 7-inch cake tin and smooth with a palette or table knife. Bake on middle shelf for 1 hr. 10 min. at 360° Fahr. Regulo Mark 4.

2 large eggs (beaten).

Their weight, in shells, in margarine and castor sugar and Self-raising Flour.

Pinch of salt.

3-4 drops Vanilla essence or grated rind of half a lemon.

Sieve the flour and salt. Beat the margarine until soft, add the sugar and essence or rind and cream together until the mixture is light in colour and fluffy in texture. Add the eggs one at a time, together with a tablespoon of flour. Beat well after each addition. Stir in the remainder of the flour and salt. Put the mixture into two lined 7 inch sandwich tins. Smooth level with a table or palette knife. Bake in a moderately hot oven for twenty—twenty-five minutes or until cooked. When cold, sandwich together with jam and dust the top with castor sugar.

Middle Shelf. 380° Fahr. Regulo Mark 5.
