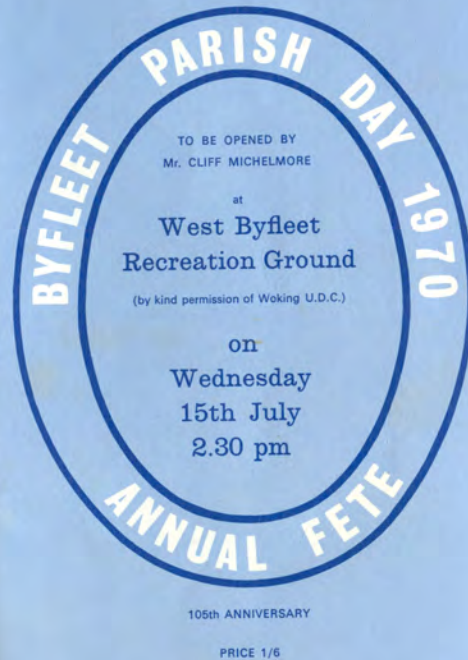

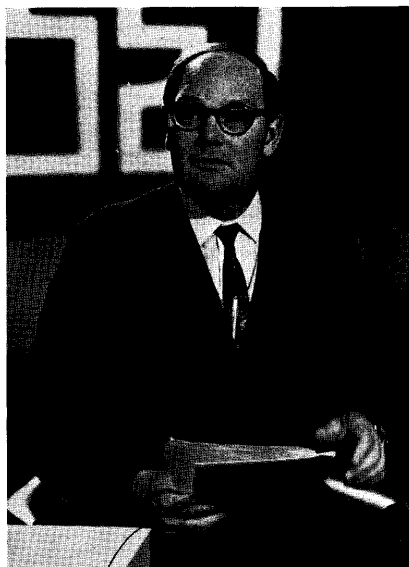

RECIPE FOR ECONOMICAL LIGHT FRUIT CAKE

- Ingredients:** 4 oz. margarine.
4 oz. castor sugar.
2 eggs.
8 oz. flour (with plain flour 2 level teaspoons baking powder).
Approx. 8 oz. dried fruit.
1-2 oz. chopped candied peel.
Milk to mix—approx. 6 tablespoons.
- Method:** 1. Cream together sugar and margarine and add eggs.
2. After adding the flour stir in fruit, peel and enough milk to make a slow dropping consistency.
3. Put into greased and floured tin (2 lb. loaf tin or 7 in. cake tin).
4. Bake in centre of oven, 350-375°F.—Gas Mark 4 for 1 hour or 1½ hours.
Allow shorter time for loaf tin since the cake tends to cook more quickly.
- Test before removing from the oven; the cake should have shrunk away from the sides of the tin, feel firm to the touch, and if a warm fine skewer is inserted it should come away clean.

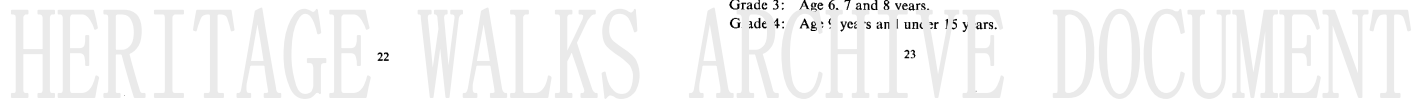

RULES AND CONDITIONS

Rule 1. Exhibitors entitled to compete in Divisions 1-7 must be resident in the parish of Byfleet, West Byfleet, Pyrford, Woodham, New Haw, Wisley or Sheerwater, or cultivate an allotment in these districts.

Rule 2. All exhibits should be ready for the Judges by 10.30 a.m. precisely. The tent will be open for the purpose of staging from 6 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. on the evening before Parish Day and also from 6 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. on Parish Day. Although the Committee cannot accept any responsibility for exhibits left in the tent, a watchman will be on duty on the ground during the night preceding Parish Day.

Rule 3. NO EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BEFORE 8.30 p.m. but prize money may be collected from 5 p.m. onwards. ONLY EXHIBITORS ALLOWED IN THE TENT BETWEEN 8.30 P.M. and 8.45 P.M. ANYTHING NOT COLLECTED BY 8.45 P.M. TO BE SOLD FOR THE BENEFIT OF PARISH DAY GENERAL FUND.

Rule 4. All allotments in Division 8 must be cultivated by the exhibitor and all produce competing grown by the exhibitor. The Committee reserve the right to inspect a competitor's allotment at their discretion. All articles for competition must be the bona fide property of and grown by the exhibitor. Nurserymen and Market Gardeners are excluded from competitive exhibiting. For the purpose of Division 2, amateurs shall be those who cultivate their own vegetables grown without regular paid help and do not practice as gardeners. For the purposes of Division 3 novices shall be those who have not previously won a prize at Byfleet Parish Day in any class of the Horticultural Section. The Committee's decision will be final regarding the eligibility of competitors.

Rule 5. Any excess or deficiency will disqualify, and Judges must not correct exhibitor's errors. An appeal (other than as to Judges' decision) made in writing at the time, with fee of five shillings (to be returned at the Committee's discretion) to the Secretary, will be considered by the Horticultural Committee within three days. Their decision must be accepted as final.

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BYFLEET PARISH DAY

By the Hon. General Secretary

I have been asked as a matter of interest to write a short list of the names of those who have held the office of President, Hon. General Secretary and Hon. Treasurer. It is a little uncertain when Presidents came into being, but it is well known that Admiral The Hon. Francis Egerton, of St. George's Hill (a former Lord Lieutenant of Surrey and Churchwarden of Byfleet) was President for some years prior to his death in 1895. The Admiral was succeeded by his wife, the Lady Louisa Egerton (1896 to her death in 1907), and was followed by her daughter, Miss Blanche Egerton, till 1914. After the first war (1923) Parish Day was revived, when Mr. F. C. Stoop, J.P., of West Hall, became President till 1926. Parish Day was not held in 1925 owing to the call for a considerable sum of money to be collected for the Byfleet Schools. In 1927 Colonel Sir John Maclure, Bart., became President and continued in office till 1937, when he resigned owing to ill health. He was followed by Mr. G. J. Bruzard in 1938 who resigned in 1965 after completing a record number of years service. He was succeeded by Sir George Edwards who is still in office in 1970.

The Hon. Secretaries in the old days seem to have been recruited from the curates of the parish. The Schedule of 1897 names as joint Secretaries the Rev. J. du V. Brunton and Mr. F. M. Butler, the latter of Byfleet Lodge (now Clock House), 1900-1903 Dr. J. K. Watson, of West Byfleet, filled the office, being succeeded 1904-1908 by the Rev. E. B. Maynard, who was followed by the Rev. Brent Harris 1909-1910. He was joined by Mr. W. H. Warter as joint Secretary for 1911, after which Mr. Warter carried on alone to the war in 1914. In 1923, when Parish Day re-started, Mr. F. B. Locke became Secretary for that year and for 1924.

Although, as stated above, there was no Parish Day in 1925, Mr. A. W. Stollery became Secretary, and in 1926 and 1927 he was joint Secretary with Mr. A. Reeves, and thereafter as Secretary till 1938. He brought Parish Day to its highest level. Mr. J. R. Hodgson took office for 1939, when the war stopped all further activities. In the year of revival, 1952, Mr. E. Nichols became the Hon. General Secretary and continued for 1953, when Mr. E. F. Bird took over for 1954 and 1955. In 1956 Brigadier J. H. D. Bennett, C.B.E., was selected and continued till 1960, when Major C. J. Wieland, M.B.E., succeeded him and remains in office for 1970.

The Hon. Treasurers have been: The Rev. Granville Money (Rector of Byfleet) 1886-1911; his son, Mr. David Money, 1912-1914; Colonel N. B. Heffernan, C.B., 1923-1924; Mr. A. D. Dodgson, 1925-1926; Major E. V. Welby, 1927-1929; Dr. Bayly Jepson, 1930-1932; Major W. B. Macegeorge, M.C., 1933-1952; Mr. F. E. Plicher in 1953 to 1961; Mr. L. R. Foster, 1962 to 1967 and Mr. J. E. Thompson, 1967-present time.

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Rule 6. The awarding of cash prizes shall be entirely at the Judge's discretion and subject to an overriding minimum of 4 entries. However, for the award of cups there should be a minimum of 6 entries. Entries for other classes to be in by Monday prior to the Show, together with entry fees, 1/- per entry in all Divisions except Divisions 2 and 3, 6d. There will be no entry fee for school-children in Division 7.

Rule 7. Every exhibitor on coming to the ground must apply to the Secretary, when they will be assigned a number and given a packet of corresponding labels, one of which must be affixed to every exhibit. No name or other means of identification of the exhibitor may appear until the Judges have made their awards.

Rule 8. No exhibitor may be awarded more than one prize in any one class.

Rule 9. No free passes will be granted to competitors or exhibitors.

Rule 10. The Committee shall have the power to make such further Rules for the successful running of the Show as it may find to be expedient, and the decision of the Committee on all points, arising out of the interpretation of the Rules shall be final.

Rule 11. The Committee does not accept responsibility for any accident to or loss of property sustained by any exhibitor or spectator.

Rule 12. All vegetables must be clean with the skins left in a natural state.
