GENERAL RULES

1. The competitive classes are open to all persons (or groups where applicable) resident within the following distances of Pyrford Village War Memorial Hall (see Map, page 17), subject to the provisions of Rule 2:—

Horticultural Division A (Open)	Miles	7
Horticultural Division B (Amateur)		3
Horticultural Floral Arrangements		7
Domestic		7
Children's		7
Photographic		7

2. (a) Persons who are employed as gardeners or who employ professional gardeners may not enter any class in Division B of the Horticultural Section.
(b) Only amateurs may enter the Photographic Classes and the Domestic Section's Hobbies classes.
3. (a) All exhibits must be the personal property of the exhibitor or exhibiting group.
(b) All Horticultural exhibits must have been grown by the exhibitor.
(c) Flowers, foliage, etc., may be purchased or otherwise obtained for use in the Floral Arrangement classes (except where specifically stated to the contrary).
(d) All Domestic and Children's exhibits must have been grown, gathered, produced, arranged, assembled or made by the exhibitor.
(e) All Photographic entries must have been photographed by the exhibitor but commercial processing is permitted.
(f) In the Creative Hobbies classes (Domestic Section) every process must have been the work of the competitor unless otherwise permitted in the schedule. In the Creative Hobbies Classes (Children's Section) factory-made parts are allowed unless otherwise stated in the schedule.
4. (a) Any contravention of Rule 3 will involve the disqualification of the exhibit concerned and may involve the disqualification of the competitor for such period of years as the Committee in their absolute discretion shall decide.
(b) An exhibitor may be required by the Committee to sign a declaration to the effect that Rule 3 has been fully observed and the Committee further reserve the right of inspection, including the inspection of exhibitors' gardens. (Continued on page 15)

(c) Non-compliance with the specification of classes in respect of numbers or nature of exhibits will involve disqualification.

5. All entry forms for all classes must be completed and signed and returned with the appropriate fee to one of the addresses indicated by 5 p.m. on the Thursday before the Show.

6. Except in the Floral Arrangement classes where one person is allowed only one entry in any one class, there is no limit to the number of entries that may be made by any one competitor in any one class.

7. (a) All exhibits must be properly and neatly staged as directed and where necessary washed. (Some hints to exhibitors appear on pages 18, 33, 39, 50.)
 (b) All exhibits must be staged between 8 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. on the day of the Show.
 (c) All exhibitors must be clear of the Show tents by 10.30 a.m. so that judging can commence promptly at 11 a.m.
 (d) Children's Section exhibits may be removed from 5 p.m. and other exhibits from 6 p.m.

6. Cash awards will be available for collection from the tents between 4.30 p.m. and 6.30 p.m. Awards not claimed between these hours shall be forfeited and shall form part of the funds of the Show.

(f) Any exhibit not claimed by 6.30 p.m. on the day of the Show may be forfeited when it shall be disposed of as the Committee thinks fit. Any proceeds of sale of such exhibits shall form part of the funds of the Show.

8. (a) The number of prizes (and/or sets of points) that any one exhibitor may win in any one class is limited as follows—
 Horticultural Section One
 Other Sections Two

(b) The conditions under which special awards are offered are to be read as part of these rules.

(c) The awarding of prizes shall be entirely at the Judges' discretion and in the event of a scant entry for any class or where the exhibits do not in the Judges' opinion warrant a prize, the Judges may decline to make an award. In any event if there are only three entries in any one class not more than two prizes shall be awarded and if there are less than three not more than one prize shall be awarded.

9. The Judge's decision as to relative merit shall be final. Any protest or objection which shall be only on the grounds of misinterpretation of the schedule, must be made in writing and lodged with the Secretary before 3 p.m. on the day of the Show and be accompanied by a fee of 10p, which will be refunded if the objection is upheld.

10. Dogs will not be admitted to the tents at any time on any consideration whatsoever.

11. This schedule shall be subject to alteration without notice if deemed necessary by the Committee.

12. The Committee shall have the power to make such further Rules for the successful running of the Show as it may find to be expedient.

13. The Committee's decision on all points arising from the Rules shall be final.

14. The Committee do not accept responsibility for any accident sustained by any exhibitor or spectator or other person before, during or after the Show nor for any damage to or loss of property.



Hints to Exhibitors (Horticultural Section)

VEGETABLES, FRUIT AND FLOWERS

(See page 33 regarding Floral Arrangements)

1. Read the Schedule carefully, noting particularly the section in which you intend to compete.
2. Note the number of items to be shown in each class; anything above or below the specified number will mean disqualification.
3. Exhibits will be judged by their qualities and not their size. Uniformity in size is important.
4. All vegetables should be properly prepared and cleaned for exhibition, while roots should be very carefully washed, in no circumstances should oil or any similar substance be used.
5. In all classes where cut material is shown, all stems must reach the water in the Vase or Receptacle. Vases and plates, etc., must be provided by exhibitors.
6. The diameter of a Plant Pot or Pan is the **INSIDE** measurement made as near the top as possible, but without including any part of the Roll or Rim.
7. Beans should be straight, crisp, long and of even size.
8. Beet. Wash with sponge, cut off small roots. Remove leaves, leaving not more than 3 inches of leaf stalk.
9. Cabbage should have firm hearts and no grub marks, leave stems on.
10. Carrots should be of even size and good colour. Sponge clean and leave 4 inches of foliage.
11. Turnips. Trim to 3 inches of leaf stalk (minimum).
12. Onions. Autumn sown. Trim off roots (except where otherwise stated).
13. Potatoes should be of uniform shape, medium size with shallow eyes and clear skin. Wash only.
14. Shallots should be of even size and well ripened. Staged as separate bulbs. NOT as clusters. Twist or tie stalk ends.
15. Rhubarb, which has been grown naturally (as distinct from that which has been forced), should have the leaf-blades removed; not more than 3 inches of a blade should be left attached to a stalk.
16. Fruit. Be careful in handling. Fruit is enhanced by its "natural bloom". Gooseberries, Raspberries and other soft fruit should be shown on the stalk. Black and Red Currants must be shown in bunches as grown.

HINTS TO EXHIBITORS (DOMESTIC)

HEMOCRAFT SECTION

Given recipe must be strictly adhered to.
Plates will be supplied in the Domestic Tent for Classes 1-6 inclusive.
Preserves should be clearly labelled with contents and date.
Preserves should not be in screw top jars.
Jars should be filled to the top.

HANDICRAFT SECTION

Dressmaking — "press as you go" for a crisp, professional look.
Articles should not be washed.
Care should be taken with the finishing and pressing of all knitted garments making sure no loose ends are left.
Embroidery should be neatly finished, pressed lightly on the wrong side with no loose ends or knots showing on the back.

GIVEN RECIPE

Madeira Cake, 6 in. tin; prepare and line tin with greaseproof paper.
8 oz. plain flour; 2 level teaspoons baking powder; pinch salt; 6 oz. margarine; 6 oz. caster sugar; finely grated rind of 2 lemons; 3 standard eggs; 2 tablespoons milk.

Method. Sieve flour and baking powder in a basin.

Beat margarine in a mixing bowl until soft, add sugar and cream thoroughly. Add lemon rind. Add eggs one at a time, beating each thoroughly. Fold in flour and add milk. Put mixture in prepared tin and smooth top. Put 2 strips lemon or citron peel on top a little apart. Bake — middle shelf Reg. 3 325° F until golden brown — about 1 1/2 hours.

The League of Friends was started in 1960. Its objects are to aid the Hospital by means of voluntary service and the provision of amenities for patients and staff which cannot be provided through the Health Service; also special personal aid to patients through the Medical Social Worker (Almoner).

During the past twelve years over £10,000 has been spent on such amenities. Our funds come through subscriptions from members; the profits of our voluntary services at the Hospital such as Out-patients' Canteen, Trolley Shop for patients and teas for visitors; special donations; and at least one big event per year, such as a Jumble Sale or Fete.

HINTS TO EXHIBITORS (Children's Section)

- All exhibits must be unaided work and an exhibit that has previously won a prize at Pyrford Flower Show may not be shown again.
- Entry forms for the Children's Section must be completed and returned with the appropriate fee (3p per entry) to one of the addresses indicated on the Children's Entry Form, not later than 5 p.m. on the Thursday before the Show.
- No name or name of school must appear on the front of any entry.
- All entries must be brought to the Children's Tent between 8 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. on the day of the Show and may not be removed until 5.30 p.m.
- Water will be provided in the Flower Arrangement Classes, but please remember to bring a receptacle to display your flowers. In Class 202 (under 5 years) flowers must be arranged in the tent on the morning of the Show.
- In the model sections, great attention should be paid to finish remembering that a well finished painted model could win extra points over an unpainted one.
- Attention to detail could win extra points in Handicraft Classes 208, 211, 219, 220, 222 and 231. Remember to take great care with finishing and pressing all garments sewn by hand or machine.
- Stamps must be in a clean condition for Classes 215, 224 and 233 and mounted on a sheet of paper measuring not more than 10 in. x 12 in. Extra points could be awarded for evidence showing a detailed knowledge of the subject.
- In the Photographic Sections, originality of subject is what the judge will be looking for coupled with skill in using the camera. Photographs may be shown singly or in groups (3p per photograph).
- Class 234, a pencil or charcoal sketch, will again be judged for originality and skill. Copying will not be encouraged in this section.

RECIPE

SMALL CHOCOLATE CAKES (Class 210)

Ingredients: 4 oz. margarine, 5 oz. caster sugar, 2 eggs, 4 oz. self-raising flour, pinch of salt, 1 heaped tablespoon cocoa, 2 tablespoons hot water.

Method: Blend the cocoa with the hot water and allow to cool. Cream the margarine and sugar until light and fluffy. Gradually beat in the cooled cocoa mixture. Add eggs one at a time, beating each in thoroughly. Add the sifted flour and salt folding in with a metal spoon. Place 1 well-heaped teaspoon of the mixture into greased and floured patty tins or paper cases placed on a baking sheet. Bake for 20-25 minutes on the second shelf from the top of a moderately hot oven, Mark 5, or 380° F. Ice and decorate when cold.
