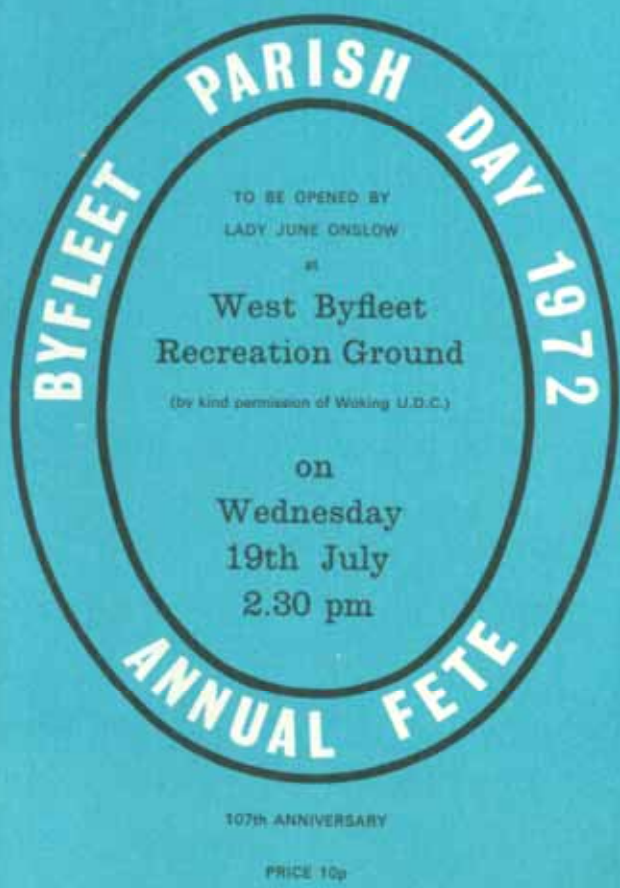

"THE SILVER STARS"

The Free Fall Parachute Display Team of the Royal Corps of Transport

The Club began as the Royal Army Service Corps Free Fall Club in 1963 and performed its first Displays the next year. Since then there has been a team taking part in displays and competitions each season. In 1965 the Royal Corps of Transport came into being and in 1971 the Club took the name "The Silver Stars" from the ten pointed star of the Corps Hatbadge, you will see this worn on the performers jumpsuits.

The interest in free fall parachuting or skydiving becomes a passion with those who progress beyond the student stage and those who become sufficiently competent to take part in public displays are the real enthusiasts. The team is not an established unit but is purely a vehicle for the jumpers to enjoy their sport and to make money to purchase their equipment. Some assistance is given by the team to a chosen Charity, The Cheshire Foundation, being the particular choice.

Those who reach the Display Team come from all over the Corps though naturally a number of them serve or have served in 63 Parachute Squadron RCT. The members of the Team come from the very wide range of jobs done by members of the Corps. Amphibious vehicle drivers, helicopter pilots, seamen and Air despatchers. The team varies in ranks from Major to private soldier but all share their love of parachuting and a common capbadge.

The Jumpmaster of the team who is responsible for the conduct of the descent is Sgt Bob Acraman. He has well in excess of 1,500 jumps and has until recently been the Chief Instructor of the Rhine Army Parachute Centre in Germany where he has won himself an international reputation. He was for many years in the Parachute Squadron of the Caps and is now instructing recruits in their basic military training in Aldershot.

If the weather is good, that is if the cloud is high and the wind is light you should see the jumpers make a delayed drop of about 20 seconds trailing smoke from generators strapped to their boots. They open their parachutes by pulling ripcords when they reach 2,000 feet above the ground. They then steer their Paracommander chutes into the Display arena. It all looks very easy but takes a lot of experience to reach display standard. The beautiful parachutes which give such soft landings could be very dangerous indeed if handled by a novice. It is hoped that the weather is good so that the display can be enjoyed to the full.

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RULES AND CONDITIONS

Rule 1. Exhibitors entitled to compete in Divisions 1-7 must be resident in the parish of Byfleet, West Byfleet, Pyrford, Woodham, New Haw, Wisley or Sheerwater, or cultivate an allotment in these districts.

Rule 2. All exhibits should be ready for the Judges by 10.30 a.m. precisely. The tent will be open for the purpose of staging from 6 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. on the evening before Parish Day and also from 6.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. on Parish Day. Although the Committee cannot accept any responsibility for exhibits left in the tent, a watchman will be on duty on the ground during the night preceding Parish Day.

Rule 3. NO EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BEFORE 8.30 p.m. but prize money may be collected from 5 p.m. onwards. ONLY EXHIBITORS ALLOWED IN THE TENT BETWEEN 8.30 P.M. and 8.45 P.M. ANYTHING NOT COLLECTED BY 8.45 P.M. TO BE SOLD FOR THE BENEFIT OF PARISH DAY GENERAL FUND.

Rule 4. All allotments in Division 8 must be cultivated by the exhibitor and all produce competing grown by the exhibitor. The Committee reserve the right to inspect a competitor's allotment at their discretion. All articles for competition must be the bona-fide property of and grown by the exhibitor. Nurserymen and Market Gardeners are excluded from competitive exhibiting. For the purpose of Division 2, amateurs shall be those who cultivate their own vegetables grown without regular paid help and do not practice as gardeners. For the purposes of Division 3 novices shall be those who have not previously won a prize at Byfleet Parish Day in any class of the Horticultural Section. The Committee's decision will be final regarding the eligibility of competitors.

Rule 5. Any excess or deficiency will disqualify, and Judges must not correct exhibitor's errors. An appeal (other than as to Judges' decision) made in writing at the time, with fee of 25p (to be returned at the Committee's discretion) to the Secretary, will be considered by the Horticultural Committee within three days. Their decision must be accepted as final.

Rule 6. The awarding of cash prizes shall be entirely at the Judges' discretion and subject to an overriding minimum of 4 entries. However, for the award of cups there should be a minimum of 6 entries. Entries for all classes to be in by Sunday prior to the Show, together with entry fees, 5p per entry in all Divisions except Divisions 2 and 3, 24p. There will be no entry fee for school-children in Division 7.

Rule 7. Every exhibitor on coming to the ground must apply to the Secretary, when they will be assigned a number and given a packet of corresponding labels, one of which must be affixed to every exhibit. No name or other means of identification of the exhibitor may appear until the Judges have made their awards.

Rule 8. No exhibitor may be awarded more than one prize in any one class

Rule 9. No free passes will be granted to competitors or exhibitors.

Rule 10. The Committee shall have the power to make such further Rules for the successful running of the Show as it may find to be expedient, and the decision of the Committee on all points, arising out of the interpretation of the Rules shall be final.

Rule 11. The Committee does not accept responsibility for any accident to or loss of property sustained by any exhibitor or spectator.

Rule 12. All vegetables must be clean with the skins left in a natural state.
