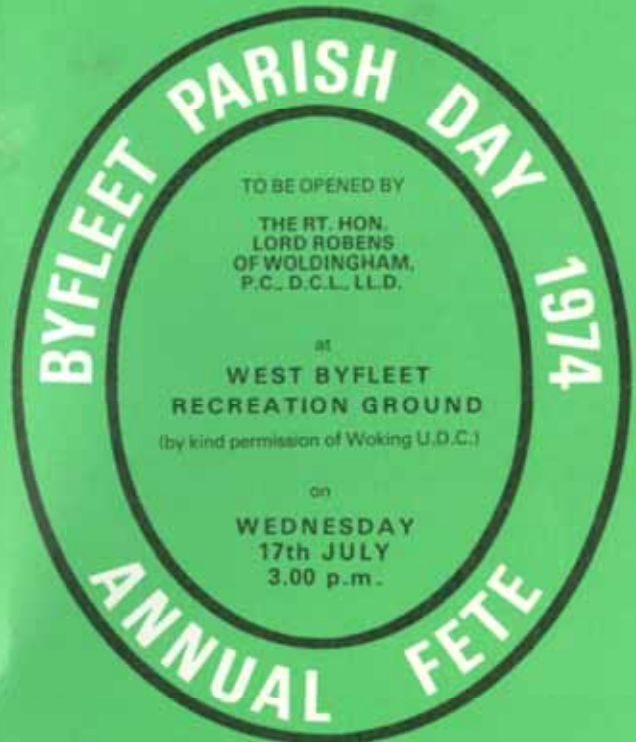

NEW CHAIRMAN

On behalf of the Parish Day General Committee, I am sorry to have to tell you that, because they have moved out of the district, Major C. J. Wieland and his wife have been compelled to resign from the Committee. John Wieland joined the Committee as Secretary in 1961, becoming Deputy Chairman in 1969, and had been our very successful Chairman since 1970. His wife Stella had also been a prominent member of the Committee since 1958. During this period much of the continuing success of Parish Day has been due to their combined hard work, conscientiousness and inspiration to the Committee and their contribution to the overall organisation of the actual event each year.

Happily, we are fortunate to have a very familiar and appropriate local personality as our new Chairman. This is the Rev. H. F. Jones, the Rector of St. Mary's Church, Byfleet, who has been a Vice President since 1959; his wife is already well-known as a long-standing member of the General Committee. The Rev. Jones election to the Chairmanship of the Committee (at the last Annual General Meeting in November 1973) is a particularly appropriate one in view of the origins of Parish Day 109 years ago being through the auspices of the local Church. I am sure that he will prove a worthy successor to John Wieland and indeed his personality has already had a beneficial effect on the organisation and staging of today's events.

I know that you will all join me in expressing our thanks and appreciation to John and Stella Wieland for all that they have done for Parish Day over so many years and in wishing them every happiness in their new home in Dorset. Also, I am sure that, with the Committee, you will want to welcome and support the Rev. Jones as our new Chairman and to wish him every success.

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THE RT. HON. LORD ROBENS OF WOLDINGHAM, P.C., D.C.L., LL.D.

Lord Robens was until June 1971 the Chairman of the National Coal Board. He has had a long and distinguished career in politics, and as Minister of Labour, was a Member of the Cabinet in the Labour Government of 1951. He became a Privy Councillor on joining the Cabinet.

Lord Robens is Chancellor of the University of Surrey. He has Honorary Degrees from the Universities of London, Newcastle upon Tyne, and Leicester, and is an Honorary Fellow of the University of Manchester Institute of Science and Technology. He is an Honorary Member of the Institution of Mining Engineers.

He was from 1962 until 1971 a Member of the National Economic Development Council. He is a Director of the Bank of England, a Director of Times Newspapers Ltd., Chairman of the Governors of Guy's Hospital. He was Chairman of a Government Committee reviewing arrangements for Safety and Health at Work. In addition, he serves a number of charitable causes.

Lord Robens is Chairman of Vickers Limited and Johnson Matthey Limited.

The tent will be open for the purpose of staging from 6 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. on the evening before Parish Day and also from 6.30 a.m. to 10.30 a.m. on Parish Day. Although the Committee cannot accept any responsibility for exhibits left in the tent, a watchman will be on duty on the ground during the night preceding Parish Day.

Rule 3. NO EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BEFORE 8.30 p.m. but prize money may be collected from 5 p.m. onwards. ONLY EXHIBITORS ALLOWED IN THE TENT BETWEEN 8.30 P.M. and 8.45 P.M. ANYTHING NOT COLLECTED BY 8.45 P.M. TO BE SOLD FOR THE BENEFIT OF PARISH DAY GENERAL FUND.

Rule 4. All allotments in Division 8 must be cultivated by the exhibitor and all produce competing grown by the exhibitor. The Committee reserve the right to inspect a competitor's allotment at their discretion. All articles for competition must be the bonafide property of and grown by the exhibitor. Nurserymen and Market Gardeners are excluded from competitive exhibiting. For the purpose of Division 2, amateurs shall be those who cultivate their own vegetables grown without regular paid help and do not practice as gardeners. For the purposes of Division 3 novices shall be those who have not previously won a first prize at Byfleet Parish Day in any class of the Horticultural Section. The Committee's decision will be final regarding the eligibility of competitors.

Rule 5. Any excess of deficiency will disqualify, and Judges must not correct exhibitor's errors. An appeal (other than as to Judges' decision) made in writing at the time, with fee of 25p (to be returned at the Committee's discretion) to the Secretary, will be considered by the Horticultural Committee within three days. Their decision must be accepted as final.
