**MR. ROBIN KNOX-JOHNSTON, C.B.E.**  
**OPENER AND GUEST OF HONOUR 1975**

Born in March 1939 and educated at Clare House, Beckenham, Kent and Berkhamstead School, Hertfordshire, Mr. Knox-Johnston first took to the sea in 1957 when he joined the Merchant Navy (with the British India Steam Navigation Company). He gained his Master's Certificate in 1965 and obtained command in 1966.

Mr. Knox-Johnston entered business in 1970 when he set up Mercury Yacht Harbour Limited at Hamble and Knox-Johnston Marine Limited of which companies he is Managing Director. He is also Director of the Marines Division of Rank Marine International and of Port Hamble Ltd. Most recently he has been appointed Managing Director of St. Katharine's Dock, London.

Mr. Knox-Johnston achieved worldwide fame and admiration from 1965 onwards with his yacht 'Suhaili'. From 1965 to 1967 he sailed 'Suhaili' from India to London via South Africa and in 1968-69 he made the first solo non-stop circumnavigation of the world in 'Suhaili' in 312 days.

Further great personal triumphs of seamanship followed. In 1970 Mr. Knox-Johnston won the Round Britain Race in 'Ocean Spirit'—in which he was also first home in the Capetown to Rio Race the following year. In 1973 he was a crew member in the British Admiral's Cup Team aboard 'Frigate' and in 1974 he again won the Round Britain Race—this time in 'British Oxygen' partnered by Mr. Gerald Boxall.

Mr. Knox-Johnston was awarded the C.B.E. in 1969 in recognition of his epic world voyage. In 1973 he was made a Younger Brother of Trinity House and a member of the Executive Committee of the Royal National Lifeboat Institute. Last year he was also made a Council Member of the National Yacht Harbour Association.

Mr. Knox-Johnston's other notable qualifications include: Associate of the Royal Institute of Naval Architects; Member of The Nautical Institute; Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society; Lieutenant Commander Royal Naval Reserve; and Chairman of the British Olympic Yachting Appeal.

Although the Committee cannot accept any responsibility for exhibits left in the tent, a watchman will be on duty on the ground during the night preceding Parish Day.

Rule 3. NO EXHIBITS SHALL BE REMOVED BEFORE 8.30 p.m. but prize money may be collected from 5 p.m. onwards. ONLY EXHIBITORS ALLOWED IN THE TENT BETWEEN 8.30 P.M. and 8.45 P.M. ANYTHING NOT COLLECTED BY 8.45 P.M. TO BE SOLD FOR THE BENEFIT OF PARISH DAY GENERAL FUND.

Rule 4. All allotments in Division 8 must be cultivated by the exhibitor and all produce competing grown by the exhibitor. The Committee reserve the right to inspect a competitor's allotment at their discretion. All articles for competition must be the bonafide property of and grown by the exhibitor. Nurserymen and Market Gardeners are excluded from competitive exhibiting. For the purpose of Division 2, amateurs shall be those who cultivate their own vegetables grown without regular paid help and do not practice as gardeners. For the purposes of Division 3 novices shall be those who have not previously won a first prize at Byfleet Parish Day in any class of the Horticultural Section. The Committee's decision will be final regarding the eligibility of competitors.

Rule 5. Any excess of deficiency will disqualify, and Judges must not correct exhibitor's errors. An appeal (other than as to Judges' decision) made in writing at the time, with fee of 25p (to be returned at the Committee's discretion) to the Secretary, will be considered by the Horticultural Committee within three days. Their decision must be accepted as final.

Rule 6. The awarding of cash prizes shall be entirely at the Judges' discretion and subject to an overriding minimum of 4 entries.
