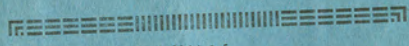

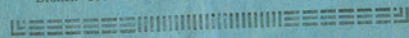

RULES GOVERNING THE ASSOCIATION COMPETITION

- 1.—All members of the Sheerwater Gardening Association together with non-member residents on the Estate are invited to enter all classes and residents in the Woking area are invited to enter the open classes.
- 2.—All exhibits must be the property of the exhibitors who must be an Amateur as defined in the R.H.S. Code of Rules and must have been grown on land in his or her possession for at least two months prior to the date of this show.
- 3.—No unauthorised person to be in the hall during the judging. The Show will be judged under the R.H.S. Code of Rules and the Judge's decision will be final as to the relative merits of all exhibits.
- 4.—All exhibits to be staged between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m. on the Friday before the Show or between 8 a.m. and 10.30 a.m. on the day of the Show. The Hall will be closed at 10.30 a.m. on the day of the Show for judging at 11 a.m.
- 5.—Exhibitors cards will be supplied by the Association for all exhibits, showing exhibitors numbers and class. These must be placed in position with the exhibit and can be obtained from the Secretary's table at the time of staging.
- 6.—The Committee reserve the right to inspect gardens and allotments of the exhibitors to ensure that only bona fide exhibits are entered.
- 7.—All allotments that are entered should show the exhibitors numbered card which should be displayed prominently in the centre of the ground concerned.
- 8.—Only one prize to be awarded where there are three or less exhibits shown in any one class; two prizes where four are shown; and three prizes where five or more are shown. In exceptional cases judges may award special prizes.
- 9.—Up more than one exhibit can be entered in any one class of any section. Two or more persons may submit for prizes separately from the same garden or allotment.
- 10.—In showing flowers no foliage or bloom, other than that of the flower called for in the schedule may be shown. No flowers are to be wired. It shall be with the discretion of the Judges to disqualify entries which in their view are overdone.
- 11.—The Association and its officials and members shall be absolved from responsibility for loss or damage, which may occur to property or property directly or indirectly from the holding of the Show. Nevertheless all reasonable care shall be taken to ensure that no loss or damage is sustained.
- 12.—No exhibit to be removed from the hall before the advertised time. Exhibits remaining 15 minutes after the time of closing will be disposed of by the Committee for the benefit of the Association's prize fund.
- 13.—The Show will be open to the public from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday, 21st August, 1954, at which hour the Show will close and exhibits may be removed.
- 14.—All entries must be made on forms provided. The Committee reserve the right to refuse any entry. No entries will be accepted after the date stated on the entry form.
- 15.—Questions, interpretations of these Rules or of ambiguity therefrom, shall be referred through the Secretary to the Show Committee, whose decision shall be final.
